
I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a Happy New Year and a big welcome to the Spring Term!

The history of "Homefield"

In medieval times, when Worthing was a tiny hamlet - an outlier of the parish of Broadwater By The Sea, most of its people were engaged in farming and fishing. In those days, fields looked very different from today. They were not enclosed by hedges or banks of trees, but were large

and open. They were subdivided into strips. Each person had a strip, from which they hoped to feed their family. Any surplus went to the Lord of the Manor.

There were three fields - the East Field (which extended as far as present-day Booklands) and the West Field (that extended to a line marked by the present-day roads of Clifton Road, Gratwicke Road and down to the sea). The field closest to where the small village was (present day North Street and High Street) was called the Home Field. Later a fourth field, the MIddle Field was created between the Home Field and the East Field.

Present day Homefield Park forms part of the original Home Field, but only a smaller part of it the original field would have extended right down to the sea. The Teville Stream marked the northern boundary. The present-day park was opened in 1873.

Homefield Park was a Victorian Town Park and was known as the "People's Park" and was the first municipal park in Worthing. It used to have an ornamental lake/pond, a footbridge and grassland where events and carnivals took place.

Parent Engagement Event

A really big thank you to everyone who attended (either in person or via the QR code) our parent engagement sessions.
